The GAA « Gaelic Athletic Association » is a sports organization to preserve Gaelic sport and spread Irish Gaelic culture. Ireland is a very traditional country and wishes to preserve its sports and cultural heritage as much as possible. It was founded in 1884 by Michael Cusack and Michael Davitt.

Irish sport is more than just a sport. It is a way of sharing between players as well as between supporters, with the same common passion: in all sports, both amateur and professional, the Irish culture through sport attracts. Stadiums are full and there are more than 2300 clubs in Ireland.
